## CHARTER

## LAKE CARGELLIGO SHOW SOCIETY INC.

The Lake Cargelligo Show Society Inc. Endeavours to provide to/for Lake Cargelligo and the surrounding District: -
Exhibits to display Livestock, Produce, Art and Manufacture from the Local District. Agricultural, Horticultural, Pastoral, Industries and Tourism Resources and the awareness of Development and Promotional Opportunity.

A welcoming and encouraging atmosphere to members of the community and visitors to the area.<br>Lake Cargelligo and districts favourite once- ayear event!

## RULES \& REGULATIONS.

The prizes will be awarded subject to the appended general regulations and conditions, disregard of which will render the exhibitor liable to be disqualified.

1. All Exhibits must be in the pavilion no later than 9.00am on the Friday or otherwise stated.
2. Exhibit card must be produced to the stewards before claiming any article from the pavilion.
3. The pavilion will be closed from 4.30 pm till 5 pm prior to exhibitors collecting their goods and exhibits so the stewards can get organised. No person to be let in or out of the pavilion with goods during this time.
4. No person is to collect exhibits from any section unless a steward is present.
5. Entries to be lodged with the Secretary at Show Office on or before the closing dates.
6. All entry fees and prizes monies will be decided annually by the Show Committee.
7. No late entry accepted on the day of the Show where there is no previous entry, except in entries where post entries apply.
8. No exhibitor will be allowed to compete for more than one prize with the same exhibit unless expressed in the list.
9. Any exhibitor proved to have knowingly made false entries for any prizes or to have wilfully infringed any of the rules will render themselves liable to adjudged by the committee, disqualified from receiving prizes which may be awarded to him/her during the show.
10. The ground will be opened for the admission of stock, produce etc, from 8 am to 4.30 pm on the day previous to the Show. No exhibit can be removed before 5.00 pm Show Day without the sanction of the Steward of the Department, failing which all prizes awarded them, shall be forfeited and their owner may be debarred from entering exhibits at a future Show.
11. The Association will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit and will not under any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss of any kind or damage to any exhibit including livestock.
12. No exhibit (livestock included) will be allowed to be displaced or removed from the ground until 5pm on the day of the show.
13. All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the judges appointed by the committee of the Association and all protests the decision of the said Committee shall be final.
14. All exhibits to be bon-a-fide property of the exhibitor or his principal. All agricultural exhibits to be grown by the exhibitor.
15. All protests must be delivered to the Secretary in writing within two hours of the award accompanied by a deposit of $\$ 50.00$, which will be liable to forfeiture should the protest be deemed frivolous
16. All prizes will be paid by the Treasurer on SHOW DAY after 11am, wherever possible. All other monies must be collected within seven (7) days of the show - otherwise, money will be forfeited except in the case of protest
17. The Judge may recommend for a prize or certificate as they see fit, any exhibit of special Merit not included in schedule.
18. Terms of Admission to be fixed by the committee.
19. A commission of $5 \%$ will be charged on all articles sold on the ground and permission must be obtained.
20. That any person using offensive language to Judges, Stewards, or any other person, may be disqualified and expelled from the ground.
21. All perpetual trophies to remain in the possession of the Show Society until won outright.
22. Exhibitors of sheep must be in attendance during judging to handle or parade their own stock.

## EXHIBITORS - PLEASE NOTE.

1. Exhibitors must deliver exhibits to the Showground on or before 4. EXHIBITORS MUST NOT REMOVE EXHIBITS WITHOUT the time advertised, complete with card attached and marked with the Class and Section of Exhibit and their name on the back of the card.
2. Exhibitors must deliver exhibits to the Steward appointed to that Class.
3. Exhibit entry tickets available from Show Office at a cost of 50 cents each.

- Any event with one entry may be cancelled.
- Indemnity \& Waiver form to be completed and signed in front of Show society witness at entry- purchasing area. Early arrivals on ground may sign forms at the secretary's office.

250 g (8oz) Sultanas
250 g (80z) Chopped Raisins
250 g (8oz) Currants
125 g (4oz) Chopped Mixed Peel
90 g (30z) Chopped Red Glace Cherries
90 g (3oz) Chopped Blanched Almonds
1/3 cup Sherry or Brandy
250 (80z) Plain Flour
60 g (2oz) Self Raising Flour
$1 / 4$ teaspoon Grated Nutmeg
$1 / 2$ teaspoon Ground Ginger
$1 / 2$ teaspoon Ground Cloves
250 g (80z) Butter
250 g (80z) Soft Brown Sugar
$1 / 2$ teaspoon Lemon Essence OR Finely Grated Lemon
$1 / 2$ teaspoon Almond Essence
½ teaspoon Vanilla Essence
4 Large Eggs

## Here's what to do:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight. Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon. Place the mixture into a prepared tin no larger than $20 \mathrm{~cm}\left(8^{\prime \prime}\right)$ and bake in a slow oven for approximately $31 / 2-4$ hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.
Note: to ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 46 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

- An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.

## HANDY HINTS.

To help and encourage exhibitors, the following "Handy Hints" are offered. The list of suggestions is not exhaustive in any Class, but some clues are given on how to prepare exhibits and to catch the approving eye of the judge.
The hints have been compiled from suggestions by Show Judges, including Land CWA Judges and successful exhibitors over many years in Show and CWA competitions.
The most important "handy hint" to pass on to all exhibitors at Shows is to read carefully and adhere to, the instructions at the head of each Class, and also the General Regulations earlier in the Schedule. Also, ensure that your entry matches the description of the relevant Section which you are entering in a specific Class.

## KNITTING AND CROCHET

- Evenness of stitching and tension through the garment is the main Judging criteria. Top knitters will not leave any sign of needle marks where they leave off. Choosing the right needle size for your wool ply is very important in getting the tension right.
- The inside of the garment must be as neatly finished as the outside. There should be no loose threads. NO knots and the seams must be neatly finished in the same yarn as the garment and not bulky. The single worst fault with most knitting is that the inside finish is not neat enough.
- ALL garments should be worked in the one fibre - eg, for a woollen jumper, seams and all finishing must be in woollen yarn, including buttons (don't sew on with cotton). In cotton crochet, all finishing in cotton etc.
- The more difficult patterns do not necessarily win more prizes. Tricky patterns can be easy to mess up and errors will glare at judges. With a simple all-over stitch (eg. stocking stitch) it can be more difficult to obtain a perfect look and this may be looked upon more favourably by judges.
- Fine crochet must lie flat with no puckering or buckling - it must have an even tension throughout with no "leggy" or loose stitches.


## NEEDLEWORK

- Machine work must be straight and parallel and finished neatly. Seam finish is very important as are hems - all must be exactly straight and the seams must intersect in exactly the same spot.


## GENERAL

- Use safety pins rather than ordinary sewing pins to attach tickets to your garment. This prevents pulling threads with loose pin ends.


## HOME BREW

- All labels should be washed off bottles.
- Bottle tops must be clean and unmarked. That is, no manufacturer's marks and no exhibitor's marks. If you have a few entries in the one category we suggest you wrap or lightly tape your own identification to the bottles when entering them. This will then be removed, and each bottle will be given a gummed entry label bearing your entry number. At the time, write down the
entry number for your own records against your list, so that after judging, you will know which "brew" was which.
- Make sure you use a separate entry form for each entry.
- Points are awarded by the judges for Clarity, Colour, Aroma, Flavour, Head and Body. The first observation the judge makes is for Colour with the judges being able to tell at once if the beer is for example, cloudy or not a true colour. Half of the total points awarded are for Flavour.


## AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE

The judge is looking for a quality which will fulfil its market e.g. Hay is for fodder so the most important points are attractiveness and palatability, smell should be sweet, fresh and untainted. It should be soft and look good enough to eat.

- Produce should not be tampered with, but "as grown". For example, don't remove leaves, heads, and roots or pick out any foreign weeds or seeds in the sample. In classes for a sample of grain, it should be presented for judging as harvested. Judges expect a certain degree of contamination and imperfection in the seed, and as long as the sample is within board requirements it will not be penalised. A judge knows what "as harvested" looks like and may even frown upon a sample which looks picked over.
- In sections for growing crop samples, height is not as important a consideration as some may think. The main criteria is always yield potential.
- Pasture samples are judged on composition, density, pureness to type and yield as far as dry matter goes.
- Your entry should be of an even size and quality.
- Freedom from disease is vital in show classes.
- Presentation is very important. Label samples neatly on a small piece of cardboard' for example giving the crop name and variety. The spirit of showing is providing an exhibition for the public, many of whom may not know wheat from barley or triticale.


## FRUIT AND VEGETABLES.

- The main clue is the time of picking. Do notallow them to over mature in aiming to go for size.
- Density and richness of colour is the number one judging points, with size next, separating otherwise equal exhibits.
- Most vegetables are best picked on the day of judging to ensure that crisp, extra fresh look and touch even one day in the fridge can affect their freshness although some, such as lettuce are alright in a crisper. Some can be picked earlier at their best and stored for showing, for example, a good pumpkin.
- Collections of the one. fruit or vegetable should be even in size and shape - choose your selection as close to the one size as possible - a small sample of the same size will score better than a lot of uneven produce.
- Heads, such as cabbage and lettuce, must be dense and firm-hearted and cauliflowers should be white and with no spread in the florets, which denotes over-maturity.
- Root vegetables must be crisp and bright with no wood in the centre. . Peas and beans must be very young and crisp. There is a tendency by some gardeners to leave them on the vine too long. They should be a bright green and have a denseness of colour.
- Rhubarb should also be crisp with no sponginess or porosity in the stalk (also a sign of over-maturity or lack of freshness).
- When exhibiting citrus fruit don't be surprised by seeing a smaller exhibit win - the main judging points are after the fruit is cut - the juiciness and the skin depth (the thinner the better). Most over large fruit is thickskinned and often dry.
- Externally the fruit (citrus) should be smooth skinned and blemish free and again your sample should be even sized, perfectly round and bright coloured. The secret to citrus is often the watering, although some varieties and some trees are better producers than others. It would be wise to check your citrus by cutting a specimen before showing.
- Eggs are another popular Section and depending on the judge, these are judged in a couple of ways. On looks they will be judged on shape and on evenness of samples, as well as size and colour. Some judges weigh the samples with weight, rather than size a telling point and some will crack an egg to check on yolk size and colour and freshness.
- Eggs must not be washed before showing as this removes the natural bloom - to clean them, use a "just" damp cloth gently.
- ABOVE ALL, the entry must be the produce of the exhibitor's own garden.
COOKERY.
- Cookery has enough "Handy Hints" for showing that a full book would be required. Just a sample is shown below.
- The main judging points observed are, the overall appearance; the cut cake; the smell and taste.
- OVERALL APPEARANCE. Above all the exhibit must look delicious after all a vital aspect is edibility! To be a 'top' exhibit it should look perfect. This includes:
- The size of the mix must match the tin size, eg, a minimum of two inches thick ( 5 cm ) for butter cakes. Wire rack marks on a cake do not enhance its appearance. . Ensure the cake cooks flat on top by concaving the centre before cooking (i.e., have the outside of the cake higher than the centre which rises more during cooking).
The cake may taste delicious but could fail on appearance.
- Greasing / lining / flouring of the tin are crucial to the look of the cake which must be exhibited as it comes out of the tin, untrimmed.
- If iced (and do not ice unless it is specified in schedule) then make it a neat even thickness, with no drips down the sides.
- $\quad$ Small cakes, biscuits and slices should be dainty - a common fault is making them too large, especially lamingtons ( 4 cm cubes, the ideal size) and slices ( 3 cm x 5 cm ).


## THE CUT CAKE.

Judging includes how it cuts (preferably without the use of a bandsaw) and its appearance when cut.

## Points to consider:

- Texture - this should be fine, even and consistent throughout with no air bubbles. Cooking time is crucial to gain the best look when cut.
- $\quad$ Cakes with fruits and nuts won't cut easily if the pieces are too large cut your dates, nuts etc. small and evenly.
- Fruit cakes won't look even throughout if the fruit sinks to the bottom during their long cooking time. Fruit must be totally dry when added to the mixture even if it has been soaked. Dry and coat with flour (NB - use flour from the recipe, not any extra).
- Colour intensity must be matched in marble and rainbow cakes. If the chocolate is dark, the pink should be dark - if you use a pale delicate pink, then the chocolate should also be light.


## SMELL AND TASTE.

Taste is the main decider in the Judges' books. The cakes must have a good flavour, true to type and strangely this can vary markedly within a class, eg, a banana cake can look good but if insufficient, tasteless or overripe (black) bananas are used, the taste will suffer. The smell goes hand in hand with taste and may even be the decider if two entries are very even in other aspects.

- An extra point for sponges is their "sponginess" for want of a better word. They must retain their shape when pressed, squashed, squeezed, wrung, bounced or whatever. Another "sponge point" - sandwich with jam, and not too thickly, never with cream - imagine the taste (not to mention the appearance) after a day or two on Show.
- And from a champion cook of 25 years - most cooking should be done the day before the Show to give them their best chance. Start early in the morning and cook until it is all done or you collapse, whichever comes first!
- Some can be done earlier to save time the day before. Lamington cake is better cooked a day ahead of icing; date and nut loaf or roll, dampers and boiled fruit cakes can be done two days early, also any biscuit or slice entries.
- Orange cake flavour is very important and this is influenced by the oranges used. It is worth trying a fruit before using it in show cooking.


## From a successful exhibitor and judge of $\mathbf{3 0}$ years:

- The guidelines of The Land Cookery Competition form a good basis.
- Scones must be cooked separately on trays, not touching, so that each scone is a perfect round shape. Shape is a very important judging point.
- In collections of biscuits and slices, make sure your collection is of distinct varieties and mixes, eg, a distinct biscuit collection may include an Anzac, a melting moment, shortbread and a macaroon. Four of the one mix with four toppings or fillings, would not be suitable.
- $\quad$ Slices and biscuits should all be even in size and shape and not too large (see earlier note): Don't overcook your biscuits - "half your competitors will, so you are in front already!"
- And a quick tip for fruit cakes - to get an even, flat top (many are bumpy) - rub your wet hand over the top of the mix before cooking.


## PICKLES, PRESERVES.

- Take more care with keeping lids clean. They must be plain, without handwriting OR commercial printing. Paint the tops or use contact for example.
- Examine tops of exhibits for mould.
- Jars should be filled to just above the neck to the lid-line so there is no gap showing between the lid and the contents. But do not over-fill the jars.


## FILLINGS FOR TARTS AND CAKES

- Fruit butters should be firm - as in butter.
- Sauce should not be thin but a firm sauce
texture.
- To add more flavour to butters, use the juices of fresh fruits. Also the seeds of the passionfruit are allowed.
- Lemon butter can be wincingly tart if too much juice is used.


## PRESERVES

- Fill jars to lid-line and pack firmly.
- Over-ripe fruit is not suitable to preserve.
- Ensure lids are properly sealed. Fruit or vegetables should be covered in syrup and jars filled to lid level - otherwise contents will darken on top.


## PICKLES, RELISHES, CHUTNEYS

- $\quad$ Fruit mince to be cut in medium size - coarsely minced fruit.
- Check definitions of difference between pickles, relish and chutney as consistency is vitally important in these exhibits and can detract from the result even if the taste is spot on. Take care not to make them too thick or too runny - sauces of pouring consistency, relishes of spreading consistency, etc.


## JAMS

- Rind of citrus should be well cooked before adding the sugar. Make sure the inside of the pan, if aluminium, is polished clean and not dark as this tends to make jam dark.
- Judges have observed that the peel could be cut finer in marmalade jams and many exhibitors had not checked the consistency of their jam exhibit.
- Some jams err in having too much fruit, eg, in marmalades. A tip with them is to use a potato peeler on the rind and then snip the narrow and thin slices with scissors.
Beware too with grapefruit jams or marmalades - the fruit can sometimes be very bitter and the jam made from them is then basically inedible. . Don't even bother exhibiting old jam - it will have lost its taste. Flavour can vary markedly between batches of stone fruit and varieties and the fruit quality controls the jam quality.
FLAVOUR is the most important element of all jams and preserves, Always taste-test your own work before exhibiting. Degree of ripeness has a big influence on flavour. Fruit must be uniformly ripe, not green and not over-ripe. AND, do consider the judges' taste-buds. You will not be doing yourself or the judge a favour if overly hot or spicy ingredients are used. If this is unavoidable, then please note this on your entry label to give fair warning to the judges!


## FLOWERS

- $\quad$ Pick most show entries on judging morning - very early (or late on the evening before) and put straight into
water up to their necks - then take inside for sorting into individual jars. It is a good idea to select one entry at a time from your list - much better than picking everything, taking it inside and then trying to choose what will go in each Section.
- $\quad$ There are some exceptions to this rule. pansies are better if picked when totally dry - early in the morning the dew can stain the petals.
- Iceland poppies can be picked early as long as they aren't too advanced. In warm weather they are best picked as buds and they will be open for showing one to two days on.
- Carnations open up more attractively if picked early, a day or two, and allowed to open indoors.
- Some cuts may be better if "conditioned". For example, one very successful exhibitor scalds the stems of poppies and dahlias by pouring boiling water on them for 60 seconds to prevent them dropping.
- Don't add anything to the-water - as long as the flowers have a good drink when they are picked most will last without additives.
- The stage of bloom at cutting time is critical. The flowers should be fully out at judging, but JUST!
- Judges look for different things with flowers and it is not always size. Symmetry is very important - an even shape, the same on both sides, and blemish-free blooms.
- Geraniums are judged on the shape of the head, which should be a true round shape, dense with flowers, and showing some foliage.
- In a Section such as that for a cut of flowering shrub, it is the length of the flowering head that is important, relative to others of the same variety.
- For individual flowers such as gerbera, size is an important consideration.


## FLORAL ART

- Some successful exhibitors in Floral Art suggest that you read the Schedule three or four times and then put it aside for a while and "sleep on it" - the inspiration will come.
- $\quad$ Floral Art Sections are in titles - they are an art form - and the title suggests a style - the finished article is a whole picture, a blend of shape, size, colour of container and contents.
- The first element is the container and it must suit the style. "Bold and Beautiful" for example would not suggest a shapely, slender container.
- The next important element is the line material, or non-plant material that provides the background, the emphasis being on "line".
- A "no-no" is for any needle aid to be visible.

Arrange foliage to hide it.
POULTRY

- Clean under scales on legs usually eg. with a pin.
- $\quad$ Shine in feathers come out by using Talc Powder.
- Combs can appear a brighter RED by using baby
oil.
- Birds can be washed with soap and water.
- A natural shine is bought out by feeding them different grains like Red Hen Scratch Mix.
